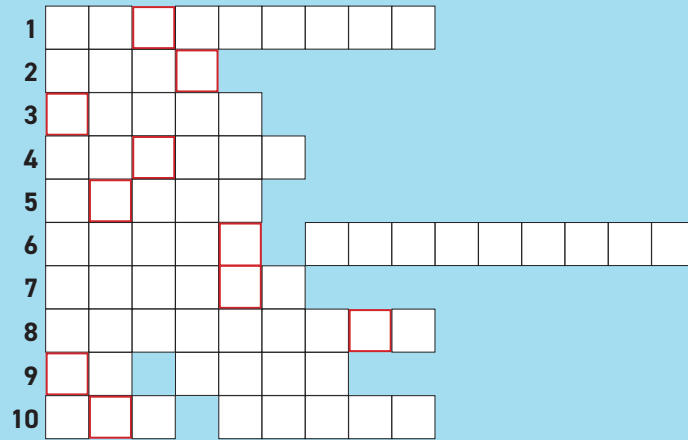
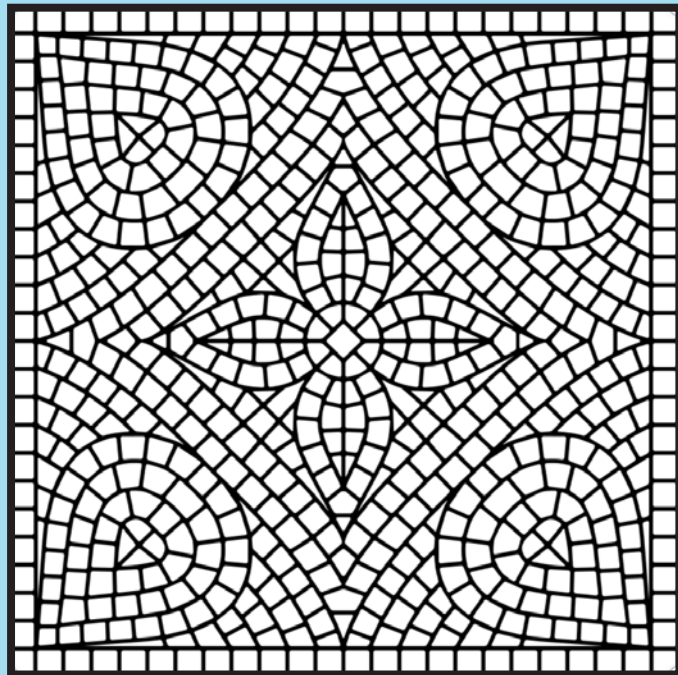


Mosaic Map Answers

MORE ABOUT THE MOSAICS

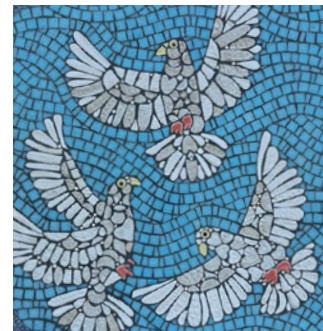
The mosaics are dedicated to our key workers for their service during the two lockdowns and to pay tribute to the people of Beaconsfield who pull together during difficult times.

The trail has been devised by Creative Partnerships Beaconsfield, a local charity that is bringing people out of isolation and releasing new skills into the area. So far, 1500 residents have taken part in tile decorating workshops between July 2022 and March 2024. Every tile is a mini masterpiece.

TRAIL ROUTE

Start the trail at the Town Hall Green.

1) Our first **Mosaic A** is at the main entrance to Waitrose.
What kind of bird is featured?

2) Look closely at the tiles. The name of the artist who made these mosaics along with members of the community is stamped into a cherry blossom, can you spot it?

Did you know?

Waitrose was originally The Railway Hotel which opened in 1907, then became a pub called The Earl of Beaconsfield. Waitrose staff were some of the key workers who decorated tiles as well as our local Royal Mail posties and Chiltern Rail staff.

3) There is a memorial garden in the Town Hall Green dedicated to Beaconsfield's most famous author. Which of her childhood characters can you see wearing a blue hat?

Cross the railway bridge and walk past Boots to find **Mosaic B** at the Royal Mail Delivery Office.

4) What kind of birds are these?

Did you know?

The swifts are framed in a cherry blossom tiles because in the late 1800's the Seeleys housing estate was actually a farm with 18 acres of cherry orchards, making it the biggest in the area.

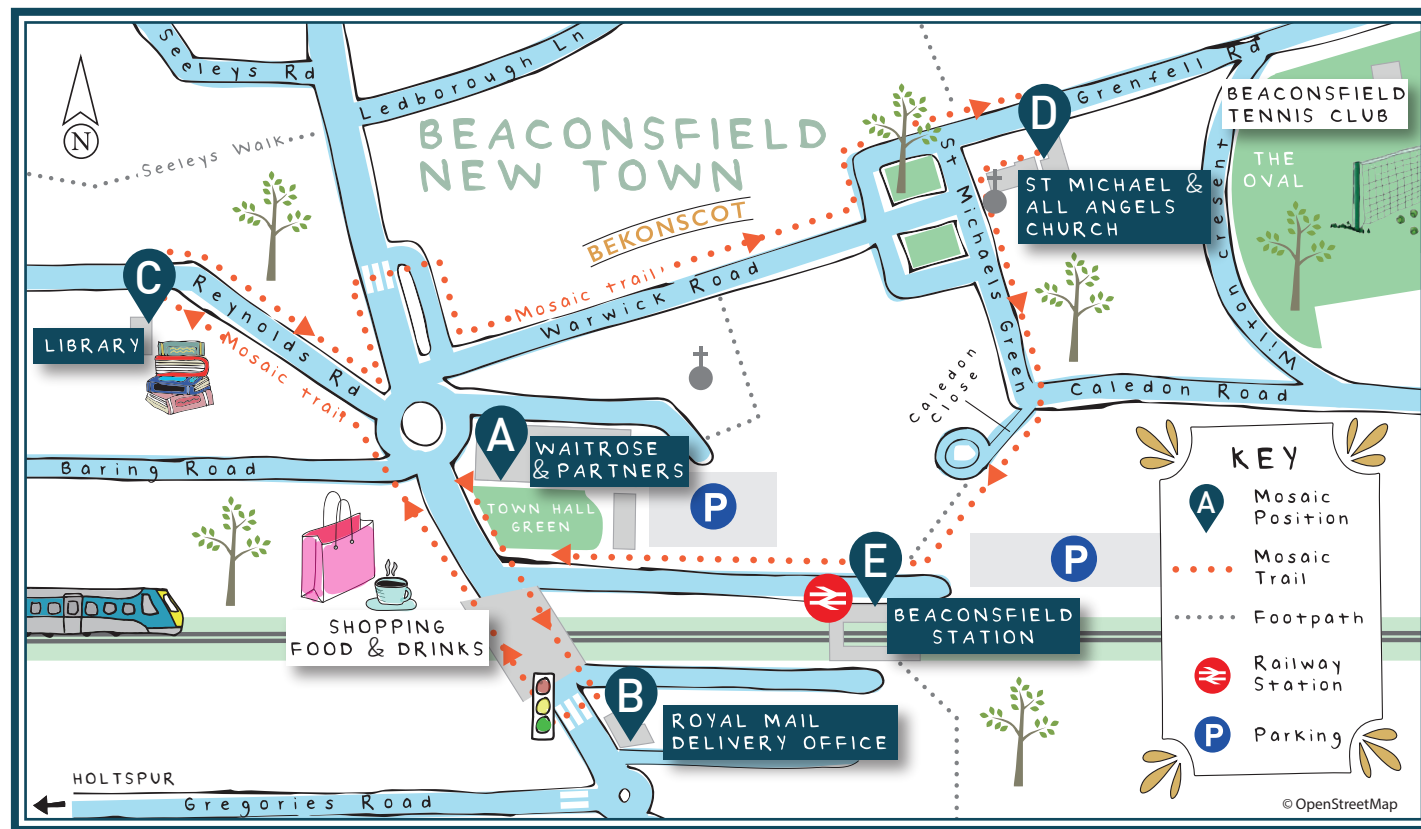
Use the zebra crossing to cross the road. Go over the railway bridge towards the library on Reynolds Road where you'll find **Mosaic C**.

5) How many orange hearts make up the border of this mosaic?

6) Can you find the tile with the name of the male author who lived in Beaconsfield and wrote Discworld books?

Did You know?

The library mosaic was unveiled by our town crier. Beaconsfield is one of just 150 towns in the UK to have a town crier. They make public announcements in a very loud voice and wear ceremonial outfits. How loudly can you shout "O-yay, o-yay, o-yay"?



Exit the library and go back to the round-about. Turn left and take the zebra crossing so you can head up Warwick Road, passing Bekonscot Model Village.

7) What miniature mode of Transport is Bekonscot famous for?

Did You know?

Bekonscot is the oldest model village in the world and dates back 100 years. Queen Elizabeth II visited when she was a little girl.

8) You will find **Mosaic D** on the St Michael's church hall. What word is at the heart of the mosaic?

9) Above it is a light blue flower which tells us to.....? Take a selfie with with the Sapphire Angel and share online #hp9_mosaics.

Did you know?

St Michaels' Church's is actually called St Michael and All Angels. So it's perfect for our Sapphire Angel. There is a small memorial garden behind the church where you can sit quietly. The construction of this church began in 1912 but was interrupted twice first by World War I and then by WW2. It was completed in 1955.

From the church entrance, head left down St Michaels Green to Caledon Close. At the end of the Caledon Crescent is a footpath that leads down to the station.

Mosaic E is on the ticket building .

10) You will find two large birds, what are they?

Now you've finished the trail why not head up to the high street to enjoy a refreshing drink in one of our lovely local cafes.
